Reinventing Middle School Education

In the fall of 2008, Normal Park inaugurated its middle school program and became part of PEF and HCDE's middle school reform initiative, an \$8.5 million program involving all county middle schools. Funded by the Lyndhurst Foundation and the National Education Association Foundation, this initiative focuses on helping each school develop its own individual plan to help as many students as possible score "advanced" in literacy and math. As a result of this initiative, students across the district are more engaged in their education, test scores are rising, and students leave middle school better prepared for the rigors of high school.

The Leadership Initiative

Through HCDE and PEF's partnership, the Leadership Initiative provides resources to help principals and teachers become strong leaders of deep change in their schools. Leadership institutes and literacy and math institutes create opportunities for teachers and principals from across the district to work together learning proven strategies for school improvement. Leadership Fellows provides training for aspiring school leaders. With funding by the Annenberg Foundation, the Leadership Initiative is building strong leaders to transform education in Hamilton County.

Student Achievement is Climbing

2008 TCAP Scores (K-5th grades, NCLB)

Math:

97% proficient or advanced, up from 71% in 2003.
57% advanced, an improvement from 22% in 2003.

Reading:

98% proficient or advanced, up from 73% in 2003.
62% advanced, an increase from 28% in 2003.

Reading: A since 2004
Science: A since 2005
